Children's Book – Slave Narrative

Your final assignment will be to write an autobiography of a slave; the form will be a children's book. You will write this book as if you were a slave in America. Your story should show understanding of the lives of slaves.

This project is very involved, with many steps. Some you have already completed; some you will complete in class, and some you will need to complete at home. If you do not complete a step well in class, then you will need to complete it at home.

Step 6:	Engage in peer editing (12/15 and 12/16 in class).
Step 7:	Create the pages of the book (12/16 and 12/17 in class).
Step 8:	Put all of the pieces together, to create your finished
	product (due on or after 1/9).

To have an acceptable grade, the final copy of your book must include:

- A narrative that shows understanding of the life of a slave
- Specific, accurate details about six of the major topics
- Visuals that help tell the story of your character
- Clear, logical organization
- Authentic first person voice, including dialogue and description
- Neat and attractive appearance
- Proper conventions in writing

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
