I wanted to remind you again about our January 17 Global Cities Network visit.

- There are about 40 visitors and we will break them up into groups and provide a typical classroom tour with about 5-10 minutes in K-5 classrooms. The Superintendent and School Board member (s) may also be on the tour.
- There are some teacher leaders on staff who will be more involved than other teachers. Karen wanted to make sure that we have our bulletin boards looking as great as they usually do because the visit is focused on looking for how we have a global perspective/competency as a school.
- No need for 'dog and pony', I am confident in showcasing what you do every day with our students:)
- The draft schedule will come out this Thursday, January 10 noting classrooms that will be visited.

This week, Bruce and I will focus our learning walks on Domain 3: Instruction, specifically, component 3c: Engaging Students in Learning. This can be evidenced by:

- Activities and assignments
- Grouping of students
- Instructional materials and resources
- Structure and pacing

An innovative rating in this component is defined as: Students, throughout the lesson, are highly intellectually engaged in significant learning, and make material contributions to the activities, student groupings, and materials. The lesson is adapted as necessary to the needs of individuals, and the structure and pacing allow for student reflection and closure.

Indicators include:

- Activities aligned with the goals of the lesson
- Student enthusiasm, interest, thinking, problem-solving, etc Learning tasks that require high-level student thinking and are aligned with lesson objectives
- Students highly motivated to work on all tasks and are persistent even when the tasks are challenging
- Students actively "working," rather than watching while their teacher "works."
- Suitable pacing of the lesson: neither dragging nor rushed, with time for closure and student reflection
